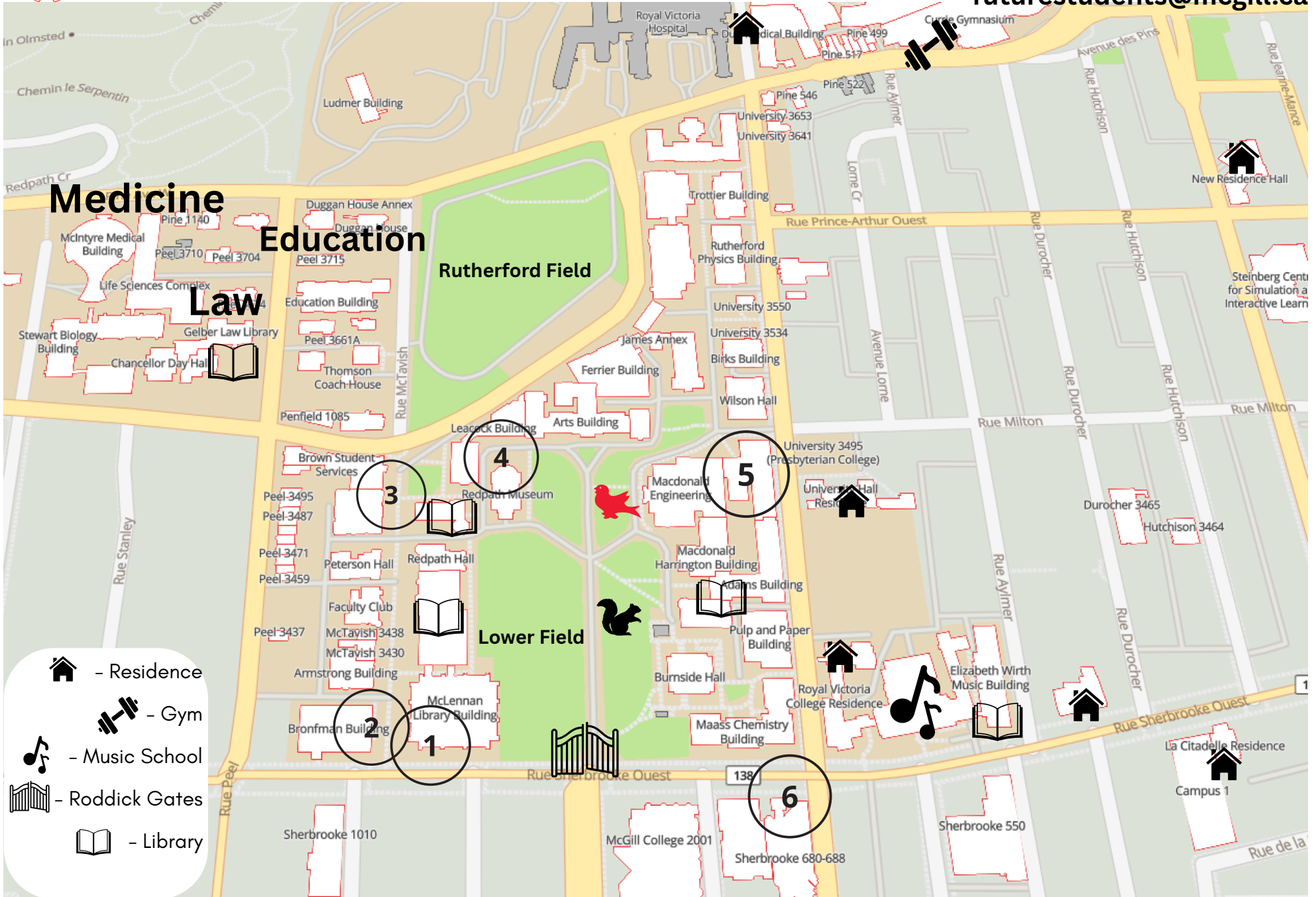




# McGill University Self Guided Tour

McGill Welcome Centre

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## #1: Welcome Centre & Service Point

You might recognize the **Welcome Centre** as the place you picked up this tour. Here, you can ask one of our Student Ambassadors questions about **admissions, applications to the university**, integrating into the city of Montreal, and more. **Service Point**, found around the corner from the Welcome Centre desk, is McGill's one-stop-shop desk for questions about administrative issues, your student ID, and student accounts. Working for either of these offices is a popular student job on campus. As a McGill student, you can work at an on-campus library, dining hall, or as a Student Ambassador.

## #2: Bronfman Building

Built in 1972, this building is home to the **Desautels Faculty of Management's** B.Com, MBA, and PhD programs. This faculty offers programs in the realm of **finance, international business, accounting**, and more. This building was funded by and named after the Bronfman family, founders of the Seagram Company Ltd., a leading Canadian distiller of whiskies and other spirits. Desautels boasts an impressive group of alumni, including Alain Bellemare, President-International of Delta Airlines, Joanne Liu, President of Doctors Without Borders, and Aldo Bensadoun, founder of Aldo Group. Students get a holistic business education and access to a variety of clubs. Feel free to pick up a snack or a coffee at *Couche-Tard Connecté*, a convenience store, or « dépanneur » run by the Retail Innovation Lab within Desautels.

## #3: SSMU & Student Services Building

As you make your way up McTavish, stop at our student union building. **SSMU** is the overarching organization that oversees McGill's 250+ student clubs and services, which range from student governance to visual art, music, and sports teams. Additionally, McGill boasts 26 varsity sports teams and counts over 500 intramural teams across more than a dozen sports. Here, you can spot Gerts, our on-campus café and bar. Just next to the student union building, you'll find the **Student Services Building**, home to several key student services. Visit **International Student Services** for help with study permits or determining your citizenship status. The student **Wellness Hub** services your physical and mental health needs on a walk-in and appointment basis. The **Career Planning Services (CAPS)** office allows students to find on and off-campus jobs, prepare for interviews, and get in touch with the McGill Alumni Network. The **Scholarships & Student Aid Office** is available to support funding various aspects of your degree.

## #4: Leacock Building

To find our next tour stop, cross McTavish Street, cut through the courtyard, and enter the Leacock Building. This building hosts the largest lecture theatre on campus, Leacock 132. Many first-year courses taken by students across faculties are held within this 612-seat classroom throughout the week. Professor offices and seminar rooms are found on the upper floors, with the Faculty of Arts Lounge in the basement. As you walk towards Leacock 132, walk up the stairs, and continue into the McCall McBain Arts Building. On your left, you will encounter Arts 150, an active learning classroom, as well as the Council Room, used for conferences and invitational events.

## #5: Eng. Quad & McConnell Engineering

This open-concept, outdoor quad is a prized study spot. You may see students catching up on course readings or having a friendly conversation with friends. Glance up the hill to see Tech Alley, home of the Rutherford Physics Building, named after a Nobel Prize Laureate, the Trottier Institute, and the Strathcona Anatomy Building. Beyond the iron gates is where the Milton Parc neighborhood is found, inhabited primarily by McGill students. Housing on campus is guaranteed, but not required, for first-year students. Enter the McConnell Engineering Building, home to classrooms and innovative research labs. Notice the student-built robotics projects in the entryway, including a rocket and dune buggies. Catch a latté at Dispatch Café or two scoops of ice cream at Frostbite, located in the General Store the left of the entrance.

## #6: The McGill Bookstore

Follow down Rue University, passing Royal Victoria College residence on your left. Peek into the windows for a glimpse of our world-class laboratories. When you reach the light, take in the hustle and bustle of Sherbrooke, a main East-West artery that spans the length of the city, before crossing the street and reaching **680 Sherbrooke**. This building is home to our School of Continuing Studies and the McGill Bookstore, where you can purchase textbooks, varsity gear, or a small souvenir. This is the last official stop of our tour, but your exploring isn't done quite yet-- the city of Montreal awaits you!
